

- 12:2 It is with our minds that we make choices as to whether we will allow our new natures or our old natures to take center stage.
- 19:4 Zaccheus' undignified behavior indicates that there was more than curiosity at play.
- 19:5 Jesus offers us scandalous grace; He does not excuse our faults, but cuts right through them to bring forgiveness and life.
- 19:5 Jesus knows our needs and how to meet them before we even know there is a need.
- 19:5 Zaccheus' desire to see Jesus was surpassed by the reality that Jesus wanted to see him.
- 19:5 The crowds may have considered him unworthy of the meeting, but God did not.
- 19:8 How we use our possessions is a major indicator of our spiritual condition.
- 19:8 Zaccheus knew his own heart and understood what stood in the way of his transformation.
- 19:9 Saving faith creates a living union with Christ that results in a changed life (James 2:14–26).
- 19:9 Zaccheus was willing to surrender the very thing he had given his life to acquiring. That is true transformation.
