THE GREATEST COMMAND

Deuteronomy 6:4-9 Kyle Denny, Operations & Connection Pastor March 30 & 31, 2019



- The book of Deuteronomy was not spoken directly to us as it was to this generation of Israel, but it was still written down for our benefit.
- 2. 6:4 Israel was to be devoted solely to the LORD (Deuteronomy 4:39).
- 3. 6:5 We do not have to hedge our bets with God; we can commit everything to Him.
- 4. 6:5 The Hebrew word 'āhab ("love") is used in Deuteronomy very specifically to refer to a covenant commitment which is based in action and is meant to seek out the well-being and pleasure of God.
- 5. 6:5 This love is in response to what God has already done.
- 6. 6:5 The Hebrew word leb ("heart") refers to the inner man or woman. It can be used to describe the seat of emotions. the seat of reason, or both. You must use your "feeler" and your "thinker" to love the Lord your God.
- 7. 6:5 The Hebrew word nepeš ("soul") could mean physically "breath, throat, or gullet," but it also has a metaphorical sense from which we derive a person as a living being. In this context, it is used as our "whole person."
- 8. 6:5 The Hebrew word m^e od ("might") carries the weight of abundance. When combined with heart and soul, it becomes an extension of all that we have.
- 9. 6:5 Jesus reaffirmed this command for his followers as the first and foremost command (Mark 12:28-32).
- 10. 6:6 You cannot hope to love God with EVERYTHING if you are not thinking of Him, if you are not taking the time and effort to know Him, if you are not putting His commands on your heart.

- **11.** *6*:7 We are to impress these commands on our children by frequent repetition. As our children grow, this teaching will sharpen the inside of them; it will deepen and broaden and come more alive to them.
- **12.** *6:8-9* These commands are meant to be anchors and safety nets, prompts and reminders for us to bring us back on track. What are you building into your life so that when you drift you will be redirected back to God?

Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and might.

Meditate on the Word in your heart.

Let it soak into your thoughts and feelings.

Teach them to your children and talk about them always.

Build reminders into your life to draw you back to it.

Has the Lord done something mighty for you? Has He already done something for you that is worthy of your full, undivided devotion?
