- 1. God's promise in verse 15 sends Adam & Eve out with a sense of hope in the midst of their lost paradise. (Genesis 3:15)
- 2. The issue humans will now face from this point forward is fundamental to human existence; How will I become right with God if I'm separated?
- 3. Genesis 3:16 indicates God's design didn't change, male and female will join for life, create one flesh & care for children. The change is that there is now physical pain and death.
- 4. Eve's internal change is that there is now some form of biological & anatomical alteration her pain will increase in childbirth.
- 5. Eve's external change is that sin forever taints her relationships. She is still Adam's wife and partner, but her position to Adam has changed.
- 6. Eve's desire will be that Adam will rule and lead her spiritually, at the same time fighting against the flesh to rule him. God's purpose in this is a constant reminder that we need the promised one to make all things new.
- 7. Adam was not deceived like Eve, he chose to disobey and heed his wife's voice over the voice of God. As the head of the human race, he is held most responsible. (Genesis 3:17-18)
- 8. The ground that was under mankind's care in the garden, the source of joy & life, now becomes the source of pain. He is now subordinate to the dirt. (Genesis 3:19)
- 9. Adam exercises faith & hope when he names Eve. He is looking ahead to the life that his wife will bring forth. In naming her, he's directly saying that he believes God, that there will be a future. (Genesis 3:20)
