- 1. Paul is not talking about a minor physical tripping in his letter, but a major spiritual one they are stepping out of line in their pursuit of Jesus. (Galatians 5:19-21)
- 2. These "wrong doings" are anything that put you out of step with Jesus and the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Paul doesn't just suggest, he doesn't gently nudge, he commands the Spiritual to restore those who are caught in wrong doings.
- 4. When Paul says "Restore" he means to re-align to a former condition of well-being. Aligning them back up with Jesus.
- 5. We are commanded to restore with gentleness. This command is for all believers. (Galatians 6:1)
- 6. To bear one another's burdens you have to get close to them. Jesus gave the perfect example He became man, walked in our ways and carried our burdens. (Isaiah 53:4-5)
- 7. We must be examining our own work, comparing not to each other, but to the law of Christ.
- **8.** The command to restore:
 - Is for All believers (v.1)
 - Is burdensome, but a privilege (v.2)
 - Reveals our own hearts
 - Doesn't remove ownership of sin.

- How much have you prayed about it?
- Do they claim to be a believer and follower of Jesus?
- Do you have a relationship with the person to actually speak into their life?
- Can you verify this is a major, habitual sin issue and not immaturity or preference or petty?
- Can you explain WHY this particular wrongdoing is a sin? Why does God oppose it? What scripture can you use to support it?
- Why do you want to bring it to their attention? Is it out of love (read 1 Cor 13) or is there a different hidden agenda for you?
- What does it look like to be gentle and winsome to the person if you are called to restore?
- Will you continue to pray for them about the process even after confrontation?
