## The Walk: Part 3 - Walking in Confrontation

Matthew 21, Mark 11, Luke 19, John 12

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- 1. Jesus' compassion and conviction is so great He has to confront and speak the truth in love. It is a reflection of the very thing He calls us to do. (Ephesians 4:15)
- 2. The 10<sup>th</sup> day of the month of Nisan is critical to Passover. It's lamb selection day, where families chose a lamb to be sacrificed to atone for their sins.
- 3. As Jesus heads toward the capitol the crowd believes nothing can stop Him. They want a king of their own design. They thought they needed to be saved from political trauma and that their agenda should be God's agenda. (John 12:12-13)
- 4. Jesus confronted the Pharisees because it had to be said. If the crowd hadn't praised Him, creation would have. (Luke 19:39-40)
- 5. Jesus walks in confrontation of this moment even though it will infuriate the leaders even more because the truth is more important than their feelings.
- 6. It is the very roar of the crowd which He knows will drive the leadership of the nation to deliver Him to a Roman cross. (John 11:53)
- 7. Jesus' willingness to walk in confrontation and let the truth be declared will end in His crucifixion. It was all part of the intricate plan of God.
- 8. Nowhere else on earth can you find the combination of immeasurable power and immeasurable compassion in one world leader. This is why Jesus is peerless.
